Holy Week begins March 29. Please join us in worship.

Palm Sunday, March 29, 10:00: We will hear and reflect on Jesus' enigmatic entrance into Jerusalem the final week of His earthly life. Children are invited to join in the palm branch processional at the beginning of the service.

Maundy Thursday, April 2, 7:00 p.m.: In a Tenebrae Service, we will hear again of the night Jesus gathered with His disciples for the Last Supper and was betrayed into the hands of His enemies.

Good Friday, April 3, 7:00 p.m. Several South Bend churches are gathering for an ecumenical Good Friday service, and we have been graciously invited to join them. This year's service will be at St. Peter's U.C.C., 915 N Ironwood Dr., South Bend (corner of Rockne and Ironwood).

Easter, April 5, 10:00 a.m.: We will celebrate Christ's Resurrection with hymns, lilies, and the Lord's Supper. An Easter Egg Hunt for the children will be offered downstairs following worship.

Spring Break & Holy Week

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This year, Holy Week falls just before the first week of April – that is to say, just before spring break for the local schools. However, many are the years when the two fall on the same week. The juxtaposition of the two weeks sets me to thinking...

Americans in general and Protestants in particular are not big on "pilgrimages," but that word comes up frequently in connection with spring break. College students make "pilgrimages" to warmer climes, and families make "pilgrimages" to vacation spots or the homes of relatives. For some, the spring break trip becomes almost a ritual, and the week becomes almost "holy" in being set aside for a special (though not religious) purpose.

I don't condemn spring break trips. In those fortunate years when spring break does not coincide with Holy Week, clergy families enjoy it as much as anyone. I well remember the year when our boys were young and we spent several glorious days at a Wisconsin Dells waterpark.

If you polled students, parents of school-age children, teachers, or other school personnel as to the relative importance of spring break vs. Holy Week, what do you think you'd find? I'd guess that spring break would win, hands-down. After all, it's about having fun, and who among us couldn't use more fun in our lives? And for families, vacation trips are often the best chance for parents and children to deepen their relationship (assuming they don't drive one another crazy!).

Indeed, for most people, including most Christians, the tendency is to conflate Palm Sunday and Easter, and to skip Holy Week altogether. It is to emphasize the "fun" parts of the week – waving palms on Palm Sunday, dressing up and hearing wonderful music on Easter, perhaps an egg hunt for the small children – and pay little attention to the dark events in between: the betrayal and sadness at the Last Supper, the horror and tragedy of Jesus' arrest, trial, and suffering, the darkness and despair of His crucifixion and death.

Why focus on those things? Don't we have enough depressing thoughts in our lives without adding to them? Why not just stay with the up-beat, the positive, the happy parts of our faith? Unlike the media emphasis on preparing for Christmas, there is no popular push for preparing for Easter.

But to skip Holy Week, to leap lightly from palm branches to Easter baskets, to skip immersion in Jesus' passion through Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, is to miss something important and life-giving, something deeper and more lasting. To quote Timothy George, Dean of Beeson Divinity School:

Of course, we know that all is not right with the world nor indeed with ourselves. Good Friday does not permit the kind of unscrupulous optimism usually found on our Easter greeting cards. But it does declare that at the heart of the universe there is a personal presence, a God who has chosen not to remain in his heaven, cocooned within himself, but who has become a part of the world he has made, and taken upon himself the burden of loving it back to himself. This he has done as a humbly born baby in a manger, as a suffering man on a cross.

We are invited by ... Holy Week to believe beyond all doubt that ... there is redemption in and beyond, though not apart from, suffering and pain, ... that time is a God-given opportunity to learn to love, and that love is the one thing we experience in time that remains in eternity.

I invite you this year to observe Holy Week. To get beneath the surface of life, to "go to dark Gethsemane," to meditate on Jesus' "sacred head, now wounded," to ask yourself, "Holy Jesus, how have I offended?" In doing so, you will be prepared for a deeper and fuller understanding of the joyous good news of Easter, that indeed "Jesus Christ Has Risen Today, Alleluia!"



NEWS FROM THE MAC

Statistics from the MAC Food Pantry located at Albright Methodist Church tell the story of the caring community this church is a part of. During the Christmas holidays Granger Community Church donated 850 boxes of food collected through their annual Christmas food drive. Both Habitat for Humanity and Broadway Christian Parish shared some of what was received through their holiday food donations. As often occurs, donations to the MAC food pantry begin to decline after the holidays, however, MAC churches and individual donations are increasing.

The Vineyard Church will be holding its first food drive of the year this month. USDA allotment coming through the Food Bank of Northern Indiana is expected within the month. Local food stores continue supporting the efforts of the Pantry. People Gotta Eat has indicated the Pantry will be included in its distribution of funds.

Carol Minx reported cash donations in December, January and February were extremely help-ful giving the Pantry a healthy beginning for 2015. Nearly 52,000 pounds of food were donated in 2014.

An in-depth discussion at the MAC meeting addressed the issue of the homeless in Mishawaka. A consortium of concerned individuals, including social workers, has been meeting. An overture to the city administration inviting discussion has not received much attention other than the city doesn't seem to agree there is much of a problem feeling it is an issue that has been handled by the churches and other community groups. Since there is no homeless shelter as such, entities who are called upon in emergency situations do what they can. The goal of the consortium is trying to find a suitable location which can be outfitted as a temporary place having on-site volunteers available to work with those in need of assistance during these emergencies. This concern is another layer for the Mishawaka Alliance of Care and it is looking for an answer to a problem that does exist.

Mission is alive and well in our community. East Methodist Church has resumed its annual Lenten Soup nights....serving from 4:30 to 6:30 on the first Thursday during Lent. First Methodist is holding Trivia Night fund raiser. Our church collected socks for those in need.

Through the benevolence of the Smock Foundation of Fort Wayne, our church now has a Smock Fund for emergency assistance to Presbyterians. It is jointly administered by our Deacons and our Mission Committee, and is only for church members. If you have, or are aware of, and emergency need, please speak to Angie Bellinger (Mission Committee) or one of our Deacons.

The Gathering, held once every three years, is an opportunity for Presbyterian women from across the country (and around the world!) to gather for worship, education, community-building, fun and renewal. Participants will enjoy workshops, tours, forums, plenary sessions with inspiring speakers and worship. So turn on your GPS, turn off your hectic schedule and follow Minnie the Moose (the 2015 CWG moose-cot) to the lovely Hyatt Regency Minneapolis June 18–21 for worship, fun, fellowship, connection and spiritual uplift! The theme of the Gathering is "One Body, One Spirit," based on 1 Corinthians 12:12–27. Registration for the event is just \$395 (less than in 2012!), with hotel rooms at the Hyatt Regency at \$169 per night (up to four guests per room). Rooms are also available at the Hilton Minneapolis.

A MEMBER'S VIEW

Every church probably thinks that there are some things they do that are uniquely theirs. Things that make them special. Three things come to my mind about 1st Pres. Mishawaka.

One is our use of our members' talents to create covers for our bulletins. Children and adults have contributed to this. When I have shared this with members from other churches, they are impressed.

A second is the make up of our session. Including the clerk, 6 of the 7 members are employed. Most churches have a much different ratio with more retirees serving, demonstrating our members' willingness to get involved.

The third is the recognition that the worship service begins and ends with the prelude and the postlude. Very few churches have congregations listening to and applauding the postlude. I am concerned about what I see as a change in this practice. If people need to leave after the benediction, they can do that quietly. If people wish to visit, that could be done in the sanctuary after the postlude or in the narthex, memorial lounge, fellowship hall, or the CE lobby. That should be done out of courtesy to the organist and those remaining listeners. Alan Camren




