They will tell the staff they didn't need to visit the Pantry because they were able to manage without assistance. As to neighborhood children, part of summer programs sponsored by the Park Department can include lunch which is offered to the kids, along with a variety of activities.

Read on...On any given Pantry day, the picture can change. In late June, the carts were being prepared for the Tuesday night clients. As the carts were being made ready the shelves were noticeably empty of some items. In Washington, DC, at a Metro Station, on a cold January morning, this man with a violin played six Bach pieces for about 45 minutes. During that time, approximately 2,000 people went through the station, most of them on their way to work.

After about 3 minutes:

a middle-aged man noticed that there was a musician playing. He slowed his pace and stopped for a few seconds, and then he hurried on to meet his schedule.

About 4 minutes later:

The violinist received his first dollar. A woman threw money in the hat and, without stopping, continued to walk.

At 6 minutes:

A young man leaned against the wall to listen to him, then looked at his watch and started to walk again.

At 10 minutes:

A 3-year old boy stopped, but his mother tugged him along hurriedly. The kid stopped to look at the violinist again, but the mother pushed hard and the child continued to walk, turning his head the whole time. This action was repeated by several other children, but every parent - without exception - forced their children to move on quickly.

At 45 minutes:

The musician played continuously. Only 6 people stopped and listened for a short while. About 20 gave money but continued to walk at their normal pace. The man collected a total of \$32.

After 1 hour:

He finished playing and silence took over. No one noticed and no one applauded. There was no recognition at all. No one knew this, but the violinist was **Joshua Bell**, one of the greatest musicians in the world. He played one of the most intricate pieces ever written, with a violin worth \$3.5 million dollars. Two days before, Joshua Bell sold out

a theater in Boston where the seats averaged \$100 each to sit and listen to this same music. This is a true story. Joshua Bell, playing incognito in the D.C. Metro Station, was organized by the Washington Post as part of a social experiment about perception, taste and people's priorities. If we do <u>not</u> have a moment to stop and listen to one of the best musicians in the world, playing some of the finest music ever written, with one of the most beautiful instruments ever made. How many other things are we missing as we rush through life?



REPORT TO THE COUNCIL OF THE PRESBYTERY OF WABASH VALLEY RE GENEVA CENTER, INC. FIRST HALF OF 2017

On behalf of the entire board of directors and all the staff at Geneva Center, we wish to thank Council and the Presbytery for the warm reception and positive show of

support the members of the GCI board who attended the June 20th Council meeting received. It was clear to all of us that Council understands our challenge, appreciates our efforts, and is willing to continue some financial support of Geneva Center going forward. The \$25,000 grant of support is appreciated and will be used effectively. To be clear, the board of GCI is working hard to get the <u>revenue from operations</u> to a level that can support GCI's <u>operational expenses</u> year over year. Reaching this level of revenue will then allow the donations and financial support from individuals and churches to be used for the <u>capital expenditures</u> that have and will arise in properly caring for and maintaining the 235-acre property and its facilities. Repairs, replacements and upgrades take funds and thus we need funding beyond what revenues from operations can provide. The first half of 2017 has been good financially for Geneva Center.

<u>Revenues from operations</u> have been \$190,587.37 or +37.5% higher than for the same period in 2016. <u>Expenses</u> have been virtually equal to last year at \$196,173.61

<u>Donations & Gifts</u> of \$37,020.25 have left us with a positive result for the first half of \$31,406.75...yet this is only about a month of fixed expenses which are around \$26,500 per month.

The \$25,000 challenge matching grant received in late March from a couple who wish to remain anonymous has only had \$6,000 of eligible donations received thus far. If we can match the remaining \$19,000 before year's end with individual gifts and support from churches, we could receive the full \$25,000 match. Any PWV church mission support counts towards the match.

The \$25,000 from Council to be received in the 2nd half will be very helpful.

<u>Future bookings</u> (groups committed for the remainder of 2017) are decent and slightly above last year, although we have plenty of available dates in August, October, November & December that we are working hard to fill. Being recognized as a *year-round retreat center* is taking a lot of communication and promotional effort, but it is slow going.

Council had asked for a breakdown of the groups using Geneva Center. Below is a table comparing the 2017 first half users to the total users for 2016:
