Spring will soon be in the air – perhaps by the time you read this column. We had a taste of it last week, but I write this during a brief, unwelcome return of winter. Spring will come: the sun will shine, birds will sing, tulips will bloom, buds will appear on trees and bushes. After a long, cold, hard winter, we are more than ready for spring. As we prepare to welcome new buds on trees, new blossoms on flowers, new green in lawns, it is appropriate to ask, "What is your growing edge?"

I have a friend who sometimes asks me that provocative question. It makes me pause – what *is* my growing edge, other than my expanding waistline and bald spot? It is so easy for me to fall into a rut of just getting by, day-by-day, doing the stuff that needs to be done (that I can't put off any longer), much of it routine. And it's so easy to just fritter away any spare time. Do I even *have* a growing edge?

How about you? What is *your* growing edge? Where do you sense growth in your mind, your spirit, your faith, your relationships, your joy?

The wonderful Howard Thurman once wrote:

Look well to the growing edge. All around us worlds are dying and new worlds are being born; all around us life is dying and life is being born. The fruit ripens on the tree, the roots are silently at work in the darkness of the earth against a time when there shall be new lives, fresh blossoms, green fruit. Such is the growing edge! It is the extra breath from the exhausted lung, the one more thing to try when all else has failed, the upward reach of life when weariness closes in upon all endeavor. This is the basis of hope in moments of despair, the incentive to carry on when times are out of joint and men have lost their reason, the source of confidence when worlds crash and dreams whiten into ash. The birth of the child — life's most dramatic answer to death — this is the growing edge incarnate. Look well to the growing edge!"

In this Eastertide, we celebrate that ours is a God of new life and new birth. The *Glory to God* hymnal includes Natalie Sleeth's beloved hymn:

In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree; In cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free! In the cold and snow of winter there's a spring that waits to be, Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

There's a song in every silence, seeking word and melody; There's a dawn in every darkness, bringing hope to you and me. From the past will come the future; what it holds, a mystery, Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

In our end is our beginning; in our time, infinity; In our doubt there is believing; in our life, eternity, In our death, a resurrection; at the last, a victory, Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

If our faith is alive, then it has growing edges as well. As 2 Peter says, *But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ*. What are the growing edges in your faith? If you can't readily name them, then perhaps you haven't been tending your faith, watering it with prayer, scripture, and spiritual conversation.

Growth is a sign of life in churches as well. What are our growing edges? Growth is not only in numbers; it can also be in spiritual depth, in mutual love and care, in service to the community, in joyful worship. I rejoice we have growing edges in all these areas as well. This spring, as we focus on preparing to search for new pastoral leadership, we will be exploring some of these things together.

In this Eastertide, this spring, may we continue to grow in grace, in faith, in caring for one another, and in serving our community. I look forward to growing with you.

Potential Wedding Ministry



Window into World Mission

The Vulnerability of Poverty

March 2014

Typhoon Yolanda remains very present in our lives as each day the death toll rises and institutions that were once able to offer help are forced to close. As of November 2013, the death toll had risen to 5,235 with 1,613 still missing, and 23,501 under treatment for wounds, infections, illness and other injuries related to the typhoon.

The reality is the sad awakening that poverty is vulnerability. The question has been raised many times about why so

many people and families living in the 555,514 homes that were totally destroyed, many of whom are now counted among the dead, did not evacuate. The answer is poverty. These houses are simple *nipa*, bamboo houses with no metal locks or grills on the window to protect the very few special items inside. These families had worked years to pay off or may still be paying for the one television set or the coveted stove oven in the home. To leave the home could mean the possibility of losing everything, not from the storm but from a break-in robbery. The loss would be so much to these families and would be devastating. This is the vulnerability of poverty.





Bethany Hospital, set up by Presbyterian Mission in 1918, which has served the region with healing for 95 years, had to temporarily close. This hospital, which had lost most of its equipment and had suffered so much damage now can no longer maintain the salaries of employees. It was left with no option but to close for a period of rehabilitation. Volunteers are set up and functioning in the parking area of Bethany Hospital with tents and are responding to the flow of patients, but this is not a sustainable solution over time. This is the vulnerability of poverty. Silliman Water Ministry, a project to provide clean drinking

water to communities in need, is presently constructing portable water filtration systems and will send the first unit this week to filter the well water of Bethany Hospital, where larger and larger crowds are gathering for treatment.

People are finding their ways to survive, but it is fragile and desperate and often dependent on outside institutions and organizations. The road to recovery will be sure, but long and winding. Your prayers and support will continue to be our strength.

Dear Friends

April 6, 2014

Cistern building season has arrived. During the next two weeks, our Presbyterian partners, both American and Mexican, will work with six families in the village of Polo Norte to build six cisterns. God willing, by July, we hope to have built twenty cisterns. Most of the families with whom we will labor together are not Presbyterian; so there will be ample opportunity for us to create with our hands, love with our kindness, and hopefully win their respect. Our cistern building foremen are men of faith with a casual and easy going way of sharing their trust in the Lord. Aside from providing clean water, technical vocational training, and a taste of what can happen when a community works together, who knows what else might happen?

During Holy Week, two of the cisterns we will build are funded by money raised by a teenage Girl Scout from Nevada. Very briefly, here's how that happened:

Thirty-five years ago, two couples became friends through fellowship in a suburban Chicago Presby. church. *Thirty years ago*, one of those couples moved to Las Vegas.

Ten years ago, the Vegas couple visited Chicago and met up with some old church friends. Stories were shared over dinner. Experience with the cistern ministry in Mexico was one of them. The Vegas couple returned to Nevada, and shared the story with their friends, some of whom were Rotarians.

Eight years ago, nearly twenty cisterns were built with money raised by Las Vegas area Rotarians—several of whom traveled to Xpujil to help build—including that couple that used to live near Chicago.

One year ago, the teenage Nevadan Girl Scout was searching for project ideas to earn the Gold Award—the highest achievement in Girl Scouts. She learned of our ministry from the Vegas couple. After researching the matter, she concluded that it fit well with her interests and abilities

Next week, after *one full year* of persistent work, she will be in Polo Norte with her father, working side by side with the families that will build the cisterns that she worked hard to fund. Truly, God works unexpectedly through relationships. Suddenly, a spark is kindled (or rekindled), intentional actions are taken, work opportunities are created, and lives change. I pray the Lord continues to bless our conversations. Blessings to you. Todd Luke


Rev. Carol McDonald Retiring

We wish Carol God's richest blessings as she moves into this new phase of her after so many years of faithful service.


While watching her mom practice on Palm Sunday, Juliet Rice drew the Holy Week. This is her first publishing of her works. What a great story to start with!
